NAADAC Code of Ethics

- Outlines professional conduct for addiction counselors.
- Emphasizes client welfare, confidentiality, cultural sensitivity, and competency in addiction treatment.
- Provides guidance on professional boundaries, self-disclosure, and ethical decision-making in complex cases.

Key Areas Covered:

- Non-discrimination and cultural humility in treatment.

ACA, APA, NASW Ethical Standards

- Provide ethical frameworks for mental health professionals, including those working in addiction treatment.
- Address confidentiality, autonomy, professional responsibility, and client-centered care.
- Guide ethical decision-making in clinical supervision, research, and advocacy.

Key Areas Covered:

- ACA (American Counseling Association) Professional integrity, informed consent, and ethical use of assessments.
- APA (American Psychological Association) Ethical principles in research, therapy, and dual relationships.
- NASW (National Association of Social Workers) Social justice, advocacy, and ethical responsibilities in client care.

State Licensing Boards & Legal Mandates

- State boards enforce legal and ethical standards for addiction professionals, including scope of practice, confidentiality laws, and disciplinary actions.
- Licensing boards vary by state, but typically align with HIPAA, 42 CFR Part 2 (confidentiality of substance use records), and informed consent laws.

Key Considerations:

- Verify licensing requirements specific to your state for addiction professionals.
- Follow state-mandated reporting laws for child abuse, elder abuse, and threats of harm.
- Ensure compliance with telehealth regulations and cross-state licensure rules.
